Thank you for allowing our SADD Chapter to once again, host a preliminary Battle of the Belts Competition. It is always such an exciting event for our students and school community. We have been hosting this event for the last six years and every year is more exciting than the last.

This year, the event was held on Thursday, April 14<sup>th</sup>. Eleven teams of four participated in the competition, including two faculty teams. Students always enjoy seeing our faculty members compete against one another and it also shows the faculty's support. Great prizes including 4 free prom tickets (value of \$65 each), gift cards from the Dairy Queen, Pizza Den and Stewart's, and movie passes to the Crandall Theater were purchased with the grant money and given away. This same group participated last year and actually improved their time from the third fastest time of 36.97. They went on to compete at the World Championship Battle of the Belts Competition on May 1<sup>st</sup>.

Local law enforcement officials were invited to attend and help officiate. Captain David Bartlett and two other Deputies from the Columbia County Sheriff's Department came to assist and show their support. Ironically, the Deputy who usually comes was unable to attend because he was hit by a drunk driver while on duty a few weeks prior to the event.

CHATHAM Nearly all the students and faculty from Chatham High School crowded around two vans in the parking lot Thursday for the 6th annual preliminary Battle of the Belts challenge. Officials this year were retired Chatham Police Chief Kevin Boehme and Deputy Sheriff Wendy Moon.
