# Mohon board adopts \$42.7 million spending plan

#### **Budget includes** 2.3 percent levy increase

The Mohonasen Board of Education unanimously adopted the 2010-11 budget on Monday, April 19.

about what we have done," he said.

The board was able to decrease the tax levy from the previous 2.4 percent estimate with an increase of \$40,000 from BOCES for the renting of rooms for the summer.

Board member Joe

Salamone said the board was able to strike a nice balance with next year's budget, and while the board was still waiting for news from the state about its budget, the administration did a good job working on the adopted budget.

The proposal is \$336,477 higher than the current 2009-2010 budget, or a 0.8 percent increase in the tax levy. After a cut in state aid, the Board

\$2.5 million in reductions across the district that would affect both faculty and staff while still trying to keep education programs intact. Cuts include the elimination of 17.6 full time equivalent positions, a reduction of \$60,583 in transportation expenditures, \$591,748 in instruction expenditures, and \$638,322 in reductions from state aid for revenues. The board also saw an increase of \$500,000 in fund balance Sean Ahern/Spotlight appropriations, with \$850,000 proposed in the 2010-11 budget. The board decided to wait until April 19 to pass the budget in the hope of hearing information from the state regarding education funding.

The budget will go before voters on Tuesday, May 18. A public hearing is set for the budget on Monday, May 10, at 6 p.m. at the Farnsworth Technology Center at Mohonasen High School.
